Canoeing is a challenge - a challenge to the canoeist's knowledge and ability to handle the craft. More important it is a challenge to use the streams and rivers and leave them in the condition you found them. Remember - only the water belongs to the State of Nebraska. The stream beds and all adjacent lands are the property of the landowners through whose land the water flows. Appreciate the fact that you have the privilege of using the waterway. Respect the landowner and their property. Nebraska Statutes give you the right to portage around fences and other obstructions, however you are responsible for any damage you may do. You must have the landowner's permission to picnic or camp. Remember to take your trash with you! Leave the property as you found it.

- Camping is permitted only at established campgrounds.
- Build your campfires only in fire rings provided at the campgrounds. Completely extinguish any fire you have built before leaving.
- Take trash with you when you leave! Don't dig or bury. Don't litter.
- If you capsize, avoid the downstream end or side of the canoe, it could pin you against an obstruction.
- Insect repellent may make your trip more enjoyable.
